

It's Not One Transition. It's Three.

Student veterans are often described as “transitioning from the military to civilian life.”

That framing misses the real complexity.

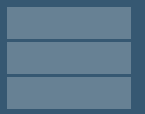
In reality, student veterans are navigating three distinct operating environments:

1. **The military environment** — structured, explicit, mission-driven
2. **The higher education environment** — decentralized, ambiguous, transitory
3. **The private-sector environment** — market-driven, value-based, and highly contextual

Most student veterans are not explicitly taught how these environments differ — or how to operate effectively in each one.

They are expected to figure it out as they go.

The challenge is not capability – **It's context.**



Two Audiences. No Shared Baseline.

Student veterans are not the only ones navigating uncertainty.

Military and veteran engagement teams are often:

- Deeply invested
- Highly committed
- And personally motivated to help student veterans succeed

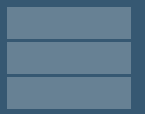
But without a **shared, standardized framework** for understanding the three environments student veterans are moving through, support becomes diffuse.

Staff try to do everything.

Students guess.

Burnout increases — not from lack of care, but from lack of clarity.

Without a common framework, effort multiplies while focus erodes.

Many student veterans never reach that point.

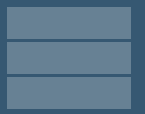
Without early career exploration:

Early Clarity Changes Everything

When career exploration is introduced early — alongside an explicit explanation of the three environments — student veterans gain:

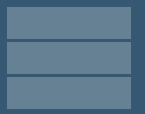
- A clearer sense of direction
